



ommunities of Sekhimini and Ga-Kuranta are celebrating the consistent supply of safer drinking water following the completion of the Sand Water Extraction Project which was launched by Human Settlement, Water and Sanitation Minister Lindiwe Sisulu late last year.

A delighted Marcia Sekopana who is 92 years old said she never thought she would have water in her yard. "I was spending my pension money paying for water from those with donkey carts or relied on my grandchildren to fetch water from the river. We are very happy that government has given us water. We want to thank our leaders."

Selina Masenya who is a member of the water committee in the village said the community was happy with the daily water supply. "We used to do laundry in the river, and would wake

up in the early hours to go and queue. At times we would spend the whole day there and that meant preparing a lunchbox when going for laundry. Before this project, I could only afford to bath once a day because of water scarcity. We are happy that Minister Sisulu thought of us. We also want to appreciate the efforts from the Municipality, because the team responds swiftly when there are pipe bursts.

Mokgadi Senanye said water is flowing every day, but there are few households without yard connections. "Honestly, there is plenty of water. We never thought we would this much water. We are no longer crying for water in this village, though we do have few households who do not have connections in their yards. We believe the municipality will assist the households with connections."

Sand water extraction project brings relief to communities of Sekhimini and Ga-Kuranta





Speaking during the launch last year, Sisulu said that South Africans must embrace innovations to find solutions to the water challenges facing the country. "In a country as dry as ours, innovation is absolutely essential. There is another company here in Limpopo experimenting with extracting water from the atmosphere. So, we can't be resistant to new ideas.

The project was implemented in the Molototsi river by Lepelle Northern Water, with the Minister saying "I am grateful for all the cooperation Lepelle Northern Water received from the two spheres of government here in Limpopo.

"This is a solution for rural areas struggling with water. We are looking for any solution that can be found to service the needs of our people. Without water there is no life," she said.

Sisulu condemned people who disrupt infrastructure projects because of 30% subcontracting. "Most of our people who do not have a job find it easy to stop a project when it starts. We have to find a way of fighting this. We must find a way of educating our people and say – anything that benefits mankind finally benefits everyone."

She praised the interim board chairperson of Lepelle Northern Water, Joe Mathebula saying he has brought changes to the changes. "Water is part of his life. He was in Robben Island and water was part of his life. We thank you for bringing water to this community. We had a great deal of problems before he came."

MMC Maditshego Sefufi said the Municipality will be responsible for operation and maintenance. "As the water service authority, we want to commit to work with all key role players at the level of local municipalities to ensure sustainability of this project. We are also going to need the support of community structures in ensuring that the infrastructure is protected against vandalism," she said.

Community of Lephephane excited over water reticulation project



The community of Lephephane (longvalley) is excited over the water supply reticulation project which is set to benefit 700 households with yard connections.

The project worth over R28 million also includes the rehabilitation work on two reservoirs, installation of fire hydrants. It has created 46 work opportunities created so far, and the end date is 30 May 2021.

Ivy Malematja, a mother of three boys said the project has helped her to buy basic necessities for the family. "I started in February, and since then I was able to buy shoes for the kids and also send something to my eldest son who is at the Capricorn TVET college. But what makes me happier is the fact that we would have water in our homes upon completion of this project."

Portia Sekgotlaboroga, also a mother of three kids said she is happy to be working in project that will bring water to the community.

"I have never had a proper job in my life, so I'm excited to be working on a project of this magnitude."

The Executive Mayor Cllr Pule Shayi announced during his Mayoral Imbizo in February that work has commenced on the Lephephane RWS reticulation which is to benefit the residents of Raselabana village. "We are recording 10% progress there. And the work is around pipe laying, yard connections with meters, refurbishment of three (3) reservoirs, but electrical works for the boreholes and pump station. At least 30 labourers are benefiting from that project."

He also said he is happy with progress made on the rural households sanitation project. "We are making steady progress in our rural household sanitation project, where we are building 8370 VIP toilets across the district, at least 1674 in each local municipality. A total of 7535 have benefited as labourers from this project. We are confident of completing the project by May 31."







MDM meets with the private sector as it moves closer to DDM launch









he Mopani District Municipality hosted a consultative session with the private sector at Karibu Leisure Resort as it mobilizes support for the new district development model to be launched on the 16th of April.

The Executive Mayor Cllr Pule Shayi told the business community that the Municipality has done much consultation with the other spheres of government, but needed the private sector to come on board. "Our efforts to ground the DDM continues with this buying-in from the private sector which is very important.

"We have done our internal work as government, and it's important that we bring to this space the private sector because the socio-economic profiling of the district should be constituted also by programmes and projects from the private sector for maximum impact across the district."

He said that the private sector had a role to play in influencing infrastructure development in the district. "This is a platform to influence government spending. We need to pull all budgets from other spheres of government into the district. This gives us an opportunity to advance the efforts to localize empowerment so that the money meant for the people of Mopani circulate in this district, and impact positively on the lives of our people."

The Executive Mayor said that the DDM presents an opportunity for the establishment of a special economic zone on agriculture. "If our competitive advantage is mining and agriculture, and our neighbouring district is Vhembe which predominantly agriculture, there is nothing stopping us from exploring for a special economic zone on agriculture between the two districts.

"Through our joint efforts, we will be able to move the informal economy which is led largely by the black majority from the periphery to the centre, from the margins to the core of the economy. This is only possible is we integrate our plans and work as a collective. It is only through our collective actions and pulling of resources in the same direction that we will be able to significantly alter the socio-economic conditions of our people."

Executive Mayor hails the role of traditional leaders as he addresses World TB Day event

Executive Mayor Cllr Pule Shayi has hailed the role played by traditional leaders and civil society organizations in the fight against TB, saying "We want to express our deep appreciation for the role played by our royal leaders in the Cheka Impilo campaign, which is aligned to our National Strategic Plan. The overall goal of the National Strategic Plan is the elimination of HIV, TB and STIs as public health threats by the year 2030."

The Executive Mayor was addressing the District TB Day event on Tuesday, 30 March at Maphalle village. The event was held under the theme: "The clock is ticking: Let's find, treat and end TB now," which is in line with the World TB Day for this year. This theme underlines the importance of this social compact. The tagline is: "Unite to end TB in our communities."

He said that despite the massive progress recorded in the fight against TB over the years, as many as 1,4 million people in the world still lost their lives to the disease every year. "We are saying TB is preventable and curable. We urge our communities to go to their nearest clinics and get tested for TB at no cost, especially when they display these symptoms: coughing for more than 2 weeks, night sweats, unexplained weight loss, and fever. The tests are much easier and quick."

He also said that the fight against TB is important within the context of the ongoing battle against Covid-19. People with TB may have weak immune system and may be at risk of getting infected with Covid-19. A person who has TB is at risk of suffering more severe symptoms from Covid-19, but the risks are even higher for a person who is HIV positive and diabetic.

"Then we should take treatment as soon as we test positive for TB. It is also important that we continue to practice healthy lifestyle. We must always wash our hands with soap and water, but also cover our mouth when we cough or sneeze. We should not lose more lives from TB when treatment is available. We also know that TB is curable even if you are HIV positive.

"But having said, people living with HIV should be screened regularly for TB for we know that TB is closely linked to HIV and is the leading cause of illness and death among people living with HIV. We do emphasize though, that TB is curable," the Executive Mayor said.

Transport MEC and Executive Mayor lead programme to disinfect taxi rank in Tzaneen





ransport and Community Safety MEC Mavhungu Lerule-Ramakhanya and Executive Mayor Cllr Pule Shayi led a programme of disinfecting the taxi rank in the Tzaneen Crossing Mall on Tuesday, 19 January.

They handed over sanitizers and disinfectant sprayers to



the taxi associations. "As the department we are responding to the challenges that we face. We have seen more people going back to work using public transport and we also responding to the calls of the district command councils in the province. All the district command councils have indicated that they have identified taxi ranks as spreaders of covid-19," the MEC said.







Executive Mayor Cllr Pule Shayi who is also the chairperson of the district command council said supporting the taxi industry is key in minimizing the spread of covid-19. "This is part of our ongoing intervention in the battle against the pandemic. We handed over sprayers and sanitizer so that we able to impact positively in keeping the entire taxi rank clean, but also ensuring that our people are safe."





Speaking during the district virtual prayer on Monday 08 February, Shayi said the district prayer is about praying for healing of those infected with covid-19, but also for strength to the frontline workers and all those who have lost loved ones to the virus, saying "we pray also for those who have lost hope for we know that hope is what will sustain us."



The Executive Mayor used the opportunity to appeal for communities to participate in the vaccination programme. "And we are saying this as leaders at this level, that we should all choose to be vaccinated so that we are able to protect our loved ones. It is the simplest things such as getting vaccinated that will demonstrate the love that we have for our communities."

He said that the church must never get weary in praying against the demon of corruption and malfeasance,

saying "as we continue to be of service to the people of our district, we also know that the devil is always creeping around waiting to pounce and co-opt leaders into his evil deeds, and it is only through prayer that we are able resist his persistent attempts.

"It is only through the Word of God, that we are able to emulate Christ, be selfless and seek righteousness at all times. We say this because we know that corruption and malfeasance robs our people of quality service delivery, and we take seriously the role of the church in praying for leaders, not only in government but in civil society and in the private sector," said Shayi.

The Executive Mayor also thanked churches in their prayers for rain. "Through your sustained prayers, we have seen the unfailing grace of the Almighty God. The recent rains have brought much relief to the district. Standing here today we are able to confirm that water levels in most of our dams have increased significantly over the past few weeks." also seeing it ourselves having lost people closest to us," he said.



MEC Masemola introduces contractors for three major roads in the district.



EC Dickson Masemola has introduced the contractor for the D3840 road (Giyani to Phalaborwa) to the community, represented by leaders from the royal councils. He said the delay in the appointment was caused by the department's decision to opt for public tender instead of shortlisting contractors from the panel.

"There are just so many opportunists when progress is recorded. They are writing all over social media suggesting the MEC is coming to Giyani because of them. I have never received any love letter myself. I have been working with the leaders of this community, interacting with His Royal Highness.

"I have been interacting with the mayor of Giyani and the leadership of the district. Those are the offices I have been working with. Those opportunists are trying their luck. We want to place it on record, that the government of the ANC is here today to fix the long outstanding problem on this road," Masemola said.

He also handed over the contractors for the D3200 (Mohlabaneng) and the D11 (Ga-Mamaila) road, saying "The new dawn is in full action as pronounced by the president."

He said the projects will create work opportunities for the community, but added that the contractors must be given space to work.





Gidela Secondary School in Blinkwater to be REVAMPED

idela Secondary School in Blinkwanter will be upgraded into state-of-the-art facility. MEC Dickson Masemola made this announcement as he handed over a contractor for the R26 million project.

"When this R26 million is spent up to the last rand, this Gidela School will be a centre of excellence. It will be a totally new environment. We are bringing this huge investment here not because we don't know where to spend it, but because we want to create modern facilities for an African child. But the performance of the school must also improve."

SALGA chairperson hands over industrial sewing machines to Khomanani Special School



he Chairperson of SALGA in Limpopo Cllr Pule Shayi has today handed over two industrial sewing machines to the Khomanani Special School in Lulekani – this as he concluded the outreach programme to the five districts where he has been handing over these machines to schools with special needs.

The outreach programme is a partnership between SALGA and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) in response to the challenges posed by the Covid-19 pandemic. As part of this programme,



SALGA has also handed over vouchers worth over three thousand rand to 170 women informal traders (SMMEs) in the province for them to buy sewing material.

"These industrial machines should be able to integrate the nature of skills they have at this level, but also improve their capacity to massify the quantities of the material they should be producing. Working with the LED unit in our municipality, we should be able to link them with the market out there for opportunities. We hold a view that this intervention will go a long in helping our SMMEs. The chairperson was joined by the Mayor of Ba-Phalaborwa Municipality, Cllr Merriam Malatji.

Executive Mayor hands over laptops to senior traditional leaders

he Mopani District Municipality has an obligation to support the institution of traditional leadership in order to fast-track development in communities, the Executive Mayor Cllr Pule Shayi said this as he handed over laptops to 31 senior traditional leaders at the Disaster Management Centre.

He said that "we believe this small effort will go a long way to assist their work." He went further to appeal to traditional leaders to continue mobilizing communities in the fight against Covid-19." The Municipality will facilitate a computer literacy training for traditional leaders.



In response, Hosi N'wamitwa who is the chairperson of the Local House of Traditional Leaders said it was a special day. "We are blessed as the Local House of Traditional Leaders in this district hence we have people coming from as far as the Eastern Cape to learn from us. We are grateful to the Executive Mayor for his foresight. He is always available for us."









Executive Mayor calls on communities to close ranks and safeguard schools







xecutive Mayor Cllr Pule Shayi has expressed his satisfaction with the level of Covid-19 compliance at the schools visited in Maruleng Municipality as part of the District's back to school campaign programme.

He however expressed his concern at the number of burglaries in schools across the district. At least four of the six schools visited so far have reported burglaries. 'We are worried that a number of schools have been targeted by criminals, and important tools such as laptops which are supposed to enhance learning and teaching are stolen. Laptops are very key in assisting our children especially in the context of the fourth industrial revolution. We are calling on our communities to close ranks and safeguard our schools."

The Executive Mayor, who was accompanied by the Speaker of MDM Cllr Wireless Sedibeng, and the Department of Education's Mopani West District Manager urged the leadership at Mosibudi High School, Lorraine Banareng Primary School and Ramatau High School to continue observing Covid-19 protocols "We cannot lower our guards now. The Covid-19 health protocols have to be respected.

He also said that the District Command Council is coordinating efforts to ensure that roads damaged by the recent rains are maintained. "Through the District Command Council, we have implored local municipalities, working with the Department of Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure to work faster in maintaining roads, prioritising the road networks that connect our communities with key institutions such as schools."

He said that the delayed reopening of schools meant that educators and learners needed to work extra hard to achieve good results at the end of the academic year. "We are here just to say that you are not alone on this journey."

opani District Municipality's Executive Mayor CIIr Pule Shayi has congratulated the Matric Class of 2020 following the announcement of the National Senior Certificate results.

Shayi has described the Matric Class of 2020 as a unique generation that has faced so much hardship, but still able to rise against all odds. "We congratulate them, and our view is that their firm resolve should serve as an inspiration to the next generations, but of immediate is the Matric Class of 2021."

The Executive Mayor congratulated the Mopani West District for their achievement as the most improved district in the province. "The district has been improving since 2018, moving from 64,4%, then 68% in 2019 and 68.4% in 2020. We also wish to congratulate Mashooro Secondary in the Mawa Circuit for their recognition as the most improved public school in the province," he said.

He went on to congratulate the Man'ombe, Tzaneen, and Nkowankowa Circuits for making it to the top ten bracket in the province in terms of bachelor passes. Man'ombe Circuit in Mopani East which has recorded 352 bachelor passes, the Tzaneen Circuit with 343 and the Nkowankowa Circuit with 336, both in Mopani West.

The Executive Mayor also congratulated Merensky High School for their recognition in the Agricultural Science category. "We are encouraged that as a District that strive towards being the food basket of Southern Africa, at least the number one school in the province in terms of Agricultural focused schools is from Mopani – Merensky High School in Mopani West. We congratulate the teacher there, Last Nadia."

"We congratulate Iszabella Le Roux from Merensky High School for being the top student from a public school in the Hospitality Studies, having score 286 marks. We acknowledge the achievement of Lihani Vorster from Hoerskool Ben Vorster who is a top student in the Tourism studies with 289 marks. The two subjects have the potential to contribute to the priority economic sectors in the Province, but most importantly also in our district," he added.

He said the Municipality has budget R2,4 million to assist learners as they make transition to institutions of higher learning. "The advert is now out as we invite applications, and the closing date is 12 March 2021. Our emphatic message to young people of this district is that you will never walk alone."

6 steps to register for vaccination if you are 60 years or older:

STEP 1



Make sure you have internet access

STEP 2



You will need a smartphone, a tablet or a computer

STEP 3



Connect to the internet and go to

https://vaccine.enroll.health.gov.za/#/

STEP 4



The welcome screen will tell you what to do next.

STEP 5



Follow the instructions Put in all the details the system asks for

STEP 6



When you are done the system will send an SMS to the phone number you provided. This SMS will tell you that you are registered. This means that the system now has you in the queue.

When it is your turn to be vaccinated, the system will send you another SMS with a date and the venue for your vaccination.

If you put in the correct address, you will be sent to the vaccination centre that is closest to your home
