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EXECUTIVE MAYOR 'S FOREWORD

As we have just celebrated Heritage Month in September, let us be reminded that we do so on the backdrop of 25 years of Freedom and Democracy. This Year (2019), Heritage Month is celebrated under the theme: "Celebrating South Africa's literary classics in the indigenous languages." The aim is to use the celebrations to galvanize society to embrace the culture of reading and incorporate it into our daily lifestyle.

Let us use Heritage Month to come together as South Africans to affirm our diverse cultures and in so doing, shape our national character as a "rainbow nation" that is at peace with itself. But as we do so, we also need to appreciate the role played by our brothers and sisters from other African countries in our liberation struggle. We have to work tirelessly to establish a society based on democratic values, social justice and fundamental human rights.

We cannot afford to have our country's image tarnished by attacks on our African brothers and

sisters by criminals. We have committed to work towards building a better Africa and a better world, and these attacks directly weaken our resolve around that. We may not feel the immediate impact, but more and more of these African countries including the countries from outside the continent may see South Africa as lawless country and that may scare potential tourists.

As a district, our vision is "to be the food basket of Southern Africa and the tourism destination of choice." We are not able to achieve this vision, if we are to be isolated as a country. The tourism industry will shed some jobs and unemployment will worsen. Let us appreciate that we are one people, separated only by the borders which were not even created by us – a direct result of many decades of colonial rule.

Let me take this opportunity to also call on all men, young and old, to take a stand against attacks on women and children. His Excellency, President Cyril Ramaphosa, has already demonstrated government's firm position against gender-based violence. He announced a five-point plan during an extraordinary joint sitting of Parliament, but we really must also step up as men to say "not in our name."

We have committed to work on achieving a positive audit outcome for this municipality, and we shall not falter in fulfilling this task. The negative opinions have for years undermined our efforts to build confidence in our work of delivering quality services to the people of our district. We can no longer afford to have this Municipality associated with adverse findings. We are encouraged by the speed at which we are moving in resolving previous findings by the Auditor General from the 2017/18 report.

But, we have also said that this cannot be an extended era where wrong doing goes unpunished. Council has adopted a Consequence Management Policy, which is in pursuit of the prescripts of Section 32 of the Municipal Finance Management Act, 56 of 2003. This Act requires municipalities to ensure the prevention of unauthorised, irregular or fruitless and wasteful expenditure and other losses.

Through this mentioned legislative provision, municipalities are directed to recover the losses from the persons responsible. The adoption of the Consequence Management Policy provides for a framework to implement this legislative directive.

We are at a point where we have to heed seriously messages around responsible water usage. We have not had sufficient rainfall over the past few years. The water in many of our dams is at frightening low levels. For example, we have already stopped abstracting water from the Middle-Letaba dam due to its reduced level. The Tzaneen dam which is a major source of water to most communities in the Greater Tzaneen Municipality is at just 9 percent. It really cannot be business as usual. We have to change our attitudes on water usage.

We have distributed additional water tankers to all our local municipalities. This is sure to assist in the supply of water to most areas where we have no alternative water sources. And while, we will continue to do our best to ensure constant supply of water, we are making this appeal to our residents to use water sparingly.

As we enter the Transport Month (October), we do so with clear conscience of the state of our roads. The rate of motor carnages and fatalities that we have had in the recent past cannot go unnoticed. We will have to work together with all interested parties towards travelling which is free of accidents. This is possible if we work together.

In the next quarter, we will work together with all government departments including municipalities; state owned entities and NGOs towards ensuring an integrated community engagement. We will do this by convening an Imbizo to allow community members to engage with their own government.

Fourth industrial revolution is one of topical issues. We have to battle with the conundrum of jobs shedding and mechanisation. These are some of the socio-economic contradictions that define the current political epoch. On the same wave length, already we will begin to imagine and ready ourselves for the future South Africa; the future educational curriculum; and effectively the future government institutions.

As we mark the 100 days of Executive Mayor in the office, there is optimism that we will deliver on what we have committed. We had identified few infrastructure projects to handover to the communities. This is not just a promise but an adherence to an unsigned social contract that we have entered into with our people.

Together we can build a better Mopani District. We do all these in the name and spirit of Thuma Mina!!!!!!!

he Executive Mayor of Mopani District Municipality, Councillor Pule Shayi has distributed 10 water tankers, five crane trucks, 20 double-cab trucks and a low belt truck to the five local municipalities on Friday, 23rd August 2019.

Shayi was joined by Members of the Mayoral Committee and representatives from all local municipalities. He said the distribution of the fleet "is part of the effort in the broader scheme of what we are supposed to do as a district, which is water provision."

He said that Greater Letaba will get three water tankers

given the challenges of water in that municipality, Greater Tzaneen and Greater Giyani will each receive two water tankers, Ba-Phalaborwa and Maruleng will each receive one water tanker, while one water tanker will be stationed centrally to assist in emergencies.

The municipality has also procured 20 double-cab trucks, which will be servicing municipalities from the satellite offices. "Each satellite office will receive four double-cab trucks. We have five crane trucks which will be shared amongst the five local municipalities. The low-bed truck and the honey-sucker will be stationed in our head office in Giyani, but we are taking the honey-sucker for testing next week," said Shayi.

Executive Mayor pledge to Least the second of the second

he Executive Mayor of Mopani District Municipality, Councillor Pule Shayi has promised to strengthen interactions with communities on matters of service delivery in the district.

Delivering his maiden State of the District Address at the Lulekani Stadium on the 12th of July, Shayi said that the municipality is "encouraged by the active participation of our communities on matters of governance. Our people have heeded the call we made in 2016, when we said that "Together advancing people's power in every community – Local government is in your hands."

"We are going to hold firm to the Back to Basics principles by ensuring sustained interactions with our communities, especially through the Imbizo programme. We must maintain constant contact with our communities by strengthening our feedback mechanisms. Our people must at all times be kept abreast of our plans, progress, and even our limitations," he said.

Much of his speech centred around youth empowerment, making pronouncement of free Wi-Fi at all public meetings and at the district's Head Offices in Giyani. "This will enable communities, young people in particular an opportunity to surf the net and also share activities for the day with rest of the world through social media platforms."

He said that 30% of municipal procurement will go to youth-owned enterprises. "We are marching ahead, and need to assure our young people that 30% of procurement at the district municipality will go to enterprises owned by young people. We will convene a youth indaba during this financial year in a bid to consolidate

the efforts of all stakeholders behind the agenda of youth development," he said.

The Executive Mayor also took the opportunity to urge communities to use water sparingly. "The dam levels are between 5% and 40%. Boreholes in some areas have dried up, collapsed while in other areas there is just no underground water due to drought.

"We need to create an awareness to our communities on the need to start using water sparingly. A joint operating committee has been established to closely monitor the situation and to fully implement water restrictions as approved by council early this year," said Shayi.

Shayi has commended the community of Dan village for supporting police work in the fight against crime, saying crime in communities undermine investor confidence, hence government has made it a priority to build safer communities.



EXECUTIVE MAYOR HANDS OVER SERVICE PROVIDERS FOR GRAVELOTTE TOWNSHIP ESTABLISHMENT PROJECT

The Executive Mayor of Mopani District Municipality Councillor Pule Shayi has handed over two service providers responsible for the Gravelotte Township Establishment Project and the Land Use Scheme (LUS) to Ba-Phalaborwa Municipality.

There is a land earmarked for township establishment in Gravelotte where 400 residential sites will be made available to the public upon the completion of the feasibility study by the service provider.

Shai says the success of the project will enable Ba-Phalaborwa Municipality to increase its revenue base. "We hosted a Land Use Seminar in July, and we said at that seminar that as municipalities we need to elevate issues of land use management and improve spatial planning. Poor planning has proven to have far reaching socio-economic impact.

"The pace at which our people want space to live and to do business is so fast. It has overtaken our way of planning. Our planning is poor and weak. We can shoulder the responsibility, but if we are leadership. We should be considerate of these obtaining conditions and ask a question – what do we do."

"Uncoordinated human settlements impede our capacity as government to deliver adequately to the needs of our people. The success of the project we are launching here today shall serve as a case study for all our municipalities to initiate similar projects, which will aid in increasing our revenue base thus also improving our capacity to deliver services and maintain our existing infrastructure," he said.

He said that the Gravelotte project gives the municipalities an opportunity to "Let's support the process. Let us work with service providers to ensure that all this work gets done within then timeframe. This project will help us undermine the apartheid planning system. We will be bringing respect to our people because they must be able to take their kids from walking distance to a crèche, to a school, to a supermarket, to work without spending R50 going to and from home."

"We have in our last council sitting appointed members to the Municipal Planning Tribunal. The Tribunal is charged with the responsibility of receiving and disposing of land development applications and land use applications within the district municipal area," said Shayi.

He says the project also means that the municipality will be staying true to the objectives of the Freedom Charter. "The biggest programme of this democratic government remains the creation of a united, non-racial, non-sexist, democratic and prosperous society. Through this project we wish to create a sustainable human settlement where our people united in their diversity will have a much improved access to socio-economic opportunities," said the Executive Mayor.

The mayor of Ba-Phalaborwa Municipality Councillor Merriam Malatji has welcomed the project. "This presents an opportunity for us as a municipality to widen our revenue collection base, which will us to improve on service delivery."

Executive Mayor leads mayoral committee on projects visit programme

The Executive Mayor of Mopani District Municipality, Councillor Pule Shayi led a team of mayoral committee members on a projects visit programme in all the five local municipalities.

The projects were identified during his State of the District Address, delivered at the Lulekani Stadium in July.

Amongst the projects visited were both the Tours Bulk Water and the Joppie-Mawa-Ramotshinyadi projects in the Greater Tzaneen Municipality, Mametja-Sekororo Water Treatment Works in Maruleng, both the Phalaborwa Sewage Plant and Mapikiri Reservoir in Ba-Phalaborwa Municipality, the Sefofotse project in Greater Letaba Municipality and Zava in the Greater Giyani Municipality.

The Executive Mayor said that he is impressed with the progress made at most of the projects. "The visits enabled us to witness the actual construction work that is being carried out by contractors in our various communities. We are confident that at the end of the 100 days, I will have a positive service delivery story to tell to communities."

"The completion of such projects will make a huge dent in terms of ensuring that our communities get potable water and that we are able to address challenges of water and sanitation. This will also bring hope to all our people," said Shayi.

Let's explore ways to benefit from Musina-Makhado SEZ, says Executive Mayor

The Executive Mayor of Mopani District Municipality Cllr Pule Shayi has directed the district's Inter-Governmental Relations Forum to explore ways in which entrepreneurs in Mopani can benefit from the Musina-Makhado Special Economic Zone project.

"The technical committee on planning and economic development must investigate how best our entrepreneurs and young people can tap into the supply value chain in the Musina-Makhado SEZ," he said.

Delivering the welcome address to the IGR forum held in July, Shayi said that all municipalities and sector departments must ensure that at least 20 percent of government procurement goes to the youth and women owned enterprises.

"The premier of our province has made a commitment during the State of the Province Address that 20 percent of government procurement will go to enterprises owned by young people, another 20 percent to women-owned, while 7 percent will go to businesses owned by people living with disabilities. We should at this level ensure this directive is implemented by our respective institutions," said Shayi.

The forum has also been seized with the task of resuscitating the Thusong Service Centre Programme in the district. "We have previously discussed the need to support the Thusong Service Centre programme, and I wish to get progress on this resolution. We have said this is an important programme of government because it takes integrated services closer to our people.

"Our people in Maruleng still have to spend their hard-earned money travelling from their rural villages to Tzaneen to access government services when we could make such services available to them at the Thusong Service Centre. What is the difficulty in getting Home Affairs to service our people at Mokwakwaila Thusong? Our technical team must make assessment on the functionality and challenges in all these centres so that we are able to elevate whatever challenges to the provincial executive for intervention," he said.

ermanent delegates to the National Council of Provinces (NCOP) visited projects in Mopani on Thursday and Friday last week, this as part of their Provincial Week Programme which ran from the 16th to the 20th of September.

The NCOP delegation to Mopani was led by Honourable Tshitereke Mathibe who was also joined by members of Limpopo Provincial Legislature. This year's Provincial Week Programme focused on local government centred around the theme: "Building sustainable, responsive and people-centred municipalities."

Executive Mayor, Councillor Pule Shayi made a presentation on the state of service delivery and welcomed the visit of the NCOP to the district. "This visit is part of oversight work for them to have a greater appreciation of what is happening at local government level, so that they are able to advocate and lobby for interventions at that level," said Shayi.

The NCOP visited the Dzingidzingi Water Reticulation Project, Makosha Road, and Mageva stadium in the Greater Giyani Municipality. In Greater Tzaneen they visited Tours Bulk Water Project, Mariveni Upgrading of Water Reticulation Network and Boreholes, Codessa and Hani Roads in Nkowankowa and Mulati Road in ward 25.



Ward committees commit to strengthening relations with traditional councils

The MMC for Finance in Mopani District Municipality, Councillor Japisa Mathonsi has told delegates to the Ward Conference that strengthening relations with royal leaders must be a priority for ward committees.

Mathonsi delivered a keynote address on-behalf of the Executive Mayor Cllr Pule Shayi to the two-day conference held in Tzaneen. She said that good relations with traditional councils will assist in curbing land invasion which lead to informal settlements and socio-economic challenges.

"We hosted a Land Use Seminar in July, and we said at that seminar that working with our royal leaders we need to improve spatial planning as municipalities. Poor planning has proven to have far reaching socio-economic impact.

"It is therefore important for us to strengthen relations with the royal councils in our areas, so that we plan together for integrated human settlement. We must at all times discourage land invasion, because government will not be able to deliver adequately to the needs of our people when human settlement has been uncoordinated." she said.

She said that ward committees must assist in encouraging communities to pay for municipal services. "We have directed at the level of the District IGR that our municipalities must work around developing or revising their revenue enhancement strategies. But, also that we must have updated credible indigent registers.

Ward committees must play a prominent role in assisting us to gather accurate data on people who can't afford to pay for services. Well, reality is that we can't be municipalities that rely on grants alone. We must be able to generate revenue to assist us to address infrastructure backlog and maintenance." said Mathonsi

Conference has resolved that a framework need to be developed to guide the increase of ward committee stipend to ensure uniformity across the district. The district IGR has previously resolved that the stipend be increased to R1 500 in all the municipalities. Delegates also said that sector departments must ensure that ward committees and political leaders are kept abreast on projects implemented in the district from inception until completion.

Mopani District Municipality Council appoints an Acting MM

n Ordinary Council Sitting of Mopani District Municipality held at the newly refurbished chamber in Giyani has approved the appointment of Quite Kgatla as the Acting Municipal Manager. Kgatla who is the Chief Financial Officer has been appointed to act in the position of Municipal Manager following the resignation of Republic Monakedi. He served his notice until the 31st of July 2019. Council also approved the appointment of Sekati Mangena as the Acting Chief Financial Officer. Council also deliberated and resolved on the following matters:

1. Head Count

Council has also adopted a project plan to conduct head count for all the district's employees and councillors.

2. Consequence Management Policy

Council adopted the Consequence Management Policy which is in pursuit of the prescripts of Section 32 of the Municipal Finance Management Act, read together with Section 62. The Act states that municipalities are required to ensure prevention of unauthorised, irregular or fruitless, and wasteful expenditure and other losses, and where necessary to recover the losses from the person responsible.

3. Reviewed Audit Committee Charter.

Council has adopted the reviewed Audit Committee Charter for the 2019/20 financial year. The Charter serves as a terms of reference for Audit Committee and also as a measurement tool to evaluate the performance of Audit Committee.

4. Reviewed Employment Equity Plan

Council has adopted the reviewed Employment Equity Plan for a period of five years. The plan is aimed at achieving equitable representation of suitably qualified people in all occupational categories through the implementation of necessary affirmative measures.

5. Appointment of Municipal Planning Tribunal Members

Council has approved the appointment of members to the District Municipal Planning Tribunal on a five-year term of office. The tribunal is charged with the responsibility of receiving and disposing of land development applications and land use applications within the district municipal area.

6. Asset write-off

Council approved to write off infrastructure assets that are dry, vandalized and or components that were stolen or not found during verification.

7. Workplace Sport and Recreation Policy

Council has approved the policy on workplace sport and recreation which seek to provide participative opportunities for municipal staff members and councillors who have interest in sports and recreation activities.

8. Progress report on the 2017/18 Audit Action

Council noted progress made in the implementation of the Audit Action Plan, with 87 findings resolved from the 113 in the Auditor General's report. Progress is made in resolving the outstanding 26 findings.

9. Skills audit for members

Council has approved the skills audit plan, which is aimed at identifying the skills and knowledge that the organization requires as well as the skills and knowledge that the municipality currently has or may need in future.

Farmers welcome the official opening of Masala Pack-house

he Department of Agriculture, Rural Development and Land Reform has officially opened the multi-million revamped Masalal pack house near Eiland in the Ba-Phalaborwa Municipality on 19th July 2019.

A group of organized farmers under the banner of GRASP which represent farmers in Gravellotte, Selwane and Priska approached the department with the request for the department to assist with revamping of the pack house.

The department then started with the process of repairs and refurbishment in 2015, and also replaced the machines to support the packing of


citrus in compliance with Euro-Gap standards. Over 120 people from the neighbouring villages of Prisca, Majeje, Xitlakati, Selwane and Khazani are now employed in the pack house.

David Mlondobodzi, a farmer who is a stone's throw away from the pack house is one of the farmers who has hailed the support from the department. Mlondobozi is the co-owner of Davano Farm Fresh (Pty) LTD together with his wife. He ventured into farming after his retrenchment from a tele-communications company in 2003. His farm now employs 13 permanent workers.

The farm produces throughout the year on a rotational basis, tomatoes, okra, green beans,

Mlondobozi says he wants to take advantage of the proximity to the pack house by engaging in citrus farming. "We want to create more jobs, and we able to do so. Citrus is one venture we want to explore so we can make use of this state of the art pack house," he said.

The pack house is currently run by Mabunda Citrus, which is a partnership between Mabunda Farmers and Lona group of companies. The consortium is expected to establish an operating company, which farmers will a 45% controlling shares, LONA with 45% and Majeje Tribal Authority with 10%.

The Speaker of Mopani District Municipality Councillor Wireless Sedibeng delivered the keynote address on behalf of MEC Nandi Ndalane who could not attend the event.

He was taken on a tour of some of the projects initiated by the department, including the fishing project at Priska village. He later told the farmers and community members gathered at Masalal pack house that government will always support initiatives that create jobs for people.

"What we have seen here today is testament that indeed our people are capable of creating work opportunities for themselves and contribute to food security. The fishing project that we saw today at Triska is the first of its kind in our district and we hope to learn from it and replicate it in other communities," Said Sedibeng.

Meanwhile, Chief Mlungisi Ntsanwisi of Majeje Tribal Authority has announced plans to make available 600 hectares of land for citrus farming.

DISTRICT EPWP FORUM RECEIVES FIRST QUARTER REPORT ON JOB OPPORTUNITIES

Thousands of job opportunities were created through the Expanded Public Works Programme since the start of the 2019/20 Financial Year, this was revealed during the District EPWP Forum held in the Greater Letaba Municipality during the month of September.

The stats as of the 13th of September indicates that the district municipality together with the five local municipalities recorded a total of 2922 job opportunities in the first quarter of the 2019/20 financial year. A bulk of those were in the Infrastructure Cluster at 1791. The Environment and Culture Cluster contributed 797, while 334 job opportunities were in the Social cluster. Mopani District Municipality alone has already achieved 50 % of its target for the year, having recorded 1361 jobs in the first quarter.

The Expanded Public Works Programme was launched by government in 2004, with the aim of creating of work opportunities for unemployed South Africans thereby fighting poverty and providing skills development. The District EPWP forum was launched in July last year, with the task of coordinating the work of implementing bodies in the district.

HEALTH MEC LAUNCHES MALARIA

SPRAYING CAMPAIGN AT ZAVA VILLAGE







The Limpopo MEC for health Dr Phophi Ramathuba has launched the malaria spraying campaign under the theme 'Zero malaria starts with me' at Zava village outside Giyani on Thursday the 5th of September. The Malaria season is between September and March.

The MEC's visit was prompted by the high number of malaria cases reported in the areas of Mopani and Vhembe districts respectively in the past years. She started her programme by visiting the family which was affected by malaria where seven family members were infected.

Ramathuba pleaded with communities to cooperate with the malaria fumigating team when they come to their houses. "In the 2017\18 financial year we experienced over eighteen thousand cases of malaria infections and hundred and sixty malaria caused mortality cases were reported but through our fumigating programme similar to the one we are launching today we managed to reduce the number in 2018\19 financial to just over six thousand infections and thirty-eight mortalities, however that thirty-eight remains a concern to us as government."

"We have identified Zava village because the area is one of the areas prone to the disease, through our interactions with the traditional leader we have agreed to work together particularly on the relationship between fumigation team and community members." she said.

Emma Mashale (86) told the MEC that she and her family members were victims of malaria in the past year. "I would like warn those who refuse malaria control team to spray their houses that the disease is real it attacked me and my six family members, fortunately we got assisted from the clinic and NKhesani hospital but the disease is painful, I urge all community members to cooperate with the team in order to avoid dire consequences." Said Emma Mashale

The MEC reiterated that the department is committed to recording zero malaria case in the affected areas. About 70 new malaria control personnel who have been added to the existing group to beef up the team will be roaming around the Mopani District Municipality area fumigating.
