We are concluding the first quarter of the 2020/21 financial year – this on the backdrop of our ongoing battle against the coronavirus pandemic. We are observing a decline in the number of infections recorded in the district. On behalf of the leadership collective, we wish to express our heartfelt appreciation to the brave frontline workers who continue to be of great service to the people of our district.

It is because of their selfless sacrifices that we were able to save many lives in our district and across the country. The fight against the coronavirus is far from over. We appeal to our people to continue to be responsible so we are able to avoid the second wave. ### Executive Mayor hands over projects implemented as part of Covid-19 intervention



he Executive Mayor of Mopani District Municipality Cllr Pule Shayi has lauded the leaders of ward 5 in the Maruleng Municipality for ensuring that the short-term water project is completed without interruptions.

He was speaking during his visit to Santeng village where he handed over water project implemented as part of the Covid-19 intervention programme.

The project was funded with a budget reprioritized from the Municipal Infrastructure Grant allocation as per the directive from national treasury. The project was completed with a budget of just under R2 million.

The Executive Mayor said the long term solution for that community will come from the completion of Mametja-Sekororo Regional Bulk Water Project.

"We are happy that in this ward, our governance structures working with traditional leadership have ensured the project is completed without interference. We are also happy that there is value for money. Our people should be able to receive water in the context of accounting for the expenditure around Covid-19," he said.



Tebatso Ramoshaba, a resident of Santeng village said she is relieved to be getting water closer to where she stays. "People used to ridicule us saying we don't bath, hence I'm happy that we now have water." she said.

The Executive Mayor also proceeded to Selwane where he also handed over a R4 million water reticulation project from the MIG reprioritized funds. The project at Selwane covered Mahale, Nyakelang Matshelapata, Newstands, and Mokhoanana.

He appealed to leaders at Selwane to work with the entire community in guarding against illegal connections on the water reticulation system.

"Let us take ownership of this infrastructure. We believe that through a public participation programme, we will be able to get inputs from our communities on the best model for us to move fast with household connections."

### Bongi Thabatha from Nyakelang said

I am very happy that we now have water. We are just pleading with our neighbors not to do illegal connections on the pipeline because we will end up not having water.

Nandi Mogalaka from Nyakelang also said she was happy to have water closer to where she stays.





### Mopani's Executive Mayor reaches out to female farm workers











xecutive Mayor Cllr Pule Shayi says he is happy with the measures put in place by the management of Beerseuns Boerdery Agricultural Cooperative to minimize the exposure of farm workers to Covid-19.

He visited the farm on Friday 28 August as part of his outreach programme to female farm workers as Women's Month draws to an end. He handed over personal protective equipment for covid-19 as well as sanitary towels to female farm workers, which were donated by the Development Bank of Southern Africa (DBSA) and businesspeople within the district. The farm employs over 700 people and women make up 70% of the workforce.

The Executive Mayor was joined by few of his female MMCs, the Chief Whip as well as the Speaker of Maruleng Municipality. "This is part of our efforts to ensure that there is compliance on covid-19 regulations, but also to appreciate the food security measures taking place in the farming industry as part of our collective efforts to help our people.

"We needed to bring some tokens to our female employees at this farm. We consolidated a package of which includes masks, sanitizers and sanitary towels so that we begin to undermine the burden of oppression experienced by our women in society. We are happy to learn that none of the employees in this farm have been infected."

Merriam Mohale from Makhwibidung village is the Quality controller at the farm. She said she was happy with the visit by the Executive Mayor. "We are happy to have received the Executive Mayor during this women's month. We also want to appreciate the gifts."

Kobus De Beer, the managing director at the farm said that his farm supports a lot of emerging farmers in the area. "We appreciate our women a lot. They are very valuable to our company. We have a lot of women in supervisory roles. There is no job that a man can do that a woman cannot do."

## MEC Masemola commits to fix "potholed" roads in Mopani





ublic Works, Roads and Infrastructure MEC Dickson Masemola says that construction work on three of the district's badly damaged roads will start before the end of the year.

Masemola made this announcement during his inspection programme to the district. His first stop was the Giyani to Phalaborwa road where he met stakeholders led by Hosi Mahumani. He was joined by the Executive Mayor Cllr Pule Shayi, Transport MMC Cllr Japisa Mathonsi and the Mayor of Greater Giyani Municipality Cllr Basani Shibambu.

"I will be coming back here in October to handover a contractor for this road. We can't lament and throw our hands in the air in despair. We are bringing a practical solution to the problem," he said.

The Executive Mayor said the Giyani to Phalaborwa road was very important to the economy of the district, especially within the context of the Musina-Makhado SEZ as it connects the district with Mozambique.

Masemola visited the D11 (Mamaila) road and the D3200 (Mohlabaneng) road on August 14 where he met with community leaders. He said that contractors will be on site by the end of November. He called on community leaders to work together to ensure that the projects are completed on time, and "relieve our people of this stress."

"It our appeal that when this project starts, we all work together. We are going to need cohesive leadership. Issues around 30 percent sub-contracting should not delay these projects. People who want 30 percent sub-contracting must be prepared to do the work. We will not just be dishing out," said Masemola.

### Joy in abundance as Executive Mayor delivers furniture to indigent families

rans Moagi, a father of three children at
Maseke village was lost for words when the
Executive Mayor, Councillor Pule Shayi
delivered furniture to his house in the early hours of
Tuesday, 30 June.

"I don't know what to do or say. Maybe I should just kneel down and pray to God to multiply the days for the Executive Mayor," said Moagi.

The Executive Mayor pledged to buy furniture for the families a few weeks ago when MEC Basikopo Makamu handed over houses to them. Accompanied by Ba-Phalaborwa Mayor, Councillor Merriam Malatji, the Executive Mayor delivered furniture which included two beds, sofas and wardrobes to the Moagi family before proceeding to Lulekani to deliver at Sefala family.

Rosinah Sefala said she was happy to have received a house, and now the furniture. "I'm happy to finally have my family under the same roof. We had not expected this donation."

The delivery of furniture only marked the start of a long day for the Executive Mayor as he continued to reach out to the underprivileged, in a day coinciding with his birthday. He proceeded to Nwadzekudzeku village in the Greater Giyani Municipality for a sod-turning ceremony signalling the start of housing construction for yet another three indigent families. He also distributed food parcels and blankets to the three families.

The Executive Mayor was this time joined by the mayor of Greater Giyani Municipality, Councillor Basani Shivambu as well as the chief whip, Cllr Martha Maswanganyi and the MMC for community services, Cllr Mikateko Shimange-Fazi.

By mid-day he was back in Giyani where he handed-over 500 blankets to the five local municipalities to be distributed to the elderly, saying "in the absence of the pleasant summer, we needed to frontally engage with the conditions of cold winter. These blankets will go a long way in undermining those conditions."

















The Executive Mayor completed his day by visiting Maruleng Municipality where he handed over four newly-built VIP toilets (units) to the Department of Basic Education's Makhutswe/Lepelle Circuit office in Mokgahlong (Tickyline). He was notified a few weeks ago during the District's Covid-19 Command Council that officials in that office knock-off early from work due to lack of ablution facilities.

### Shayi said

"we are doing this in the context of helping the department of education to ensure that the educators are assisted through measures that give them dignity. They will be able to use this infrastructure which must impact in the manner in which they are supposed to give our learners education."

The Manager for the Department of Education's Mopani West, Phillipine Modika said she is impressed with the speed at which the Executive Mayor intervened. "We reported this matter to the District Command Council a few weeks ago. Our appreciation will be seen with the end of the year results."

Jack Mawasha, the Chairperson of Cosas in the district also applauded the effort of the Executive Mayor, saying "this will go a long way in improving the education of a black child. "The Executive Mayor thanked the businesspeople who are making a contribution in uplifting the lives of the poor. "Collectively, we can do more to advance people's power in every community."

# Partnerships between government and cooperatives very key to job creation, EM tells FABCO



Executive Mayor Councillor Pule Shayi says that Mopani District Municipality will always seek to forge partnerships with cooperatives, especially those with the capacity to contribute to food security.

He said this as he addressed the launch of FABCO's wholesale markets at the Nkowankowa Industrial Park in September. The establishment of the wholesale markets was aided by the Covid-19 Relief Fund from the Department of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development.

FABCO is now leasing Unit 203 at the Nkowankowa Industrial Park which will be used for farm units, farm mechanisation, and farm fresh produce. Mopani District Municipality has entered into partnership with FABCO and has been supporting their programmes, including the hosting of their conference.

The cooperative now holds the rights to Mahindra Tractor's dealership after receiving funding from Limpopo Economic Development Agency. The funding from LEDA assisted them to negotiate with Mahindra International in Mumbai, India for the dealership.

The Executive Mayor said the success of FABCO Primary Cooperative Limited will prove to people that "radical economic transformation can be implemented without getting your hands in the cookie jar."

He said that government, at the level of municipalities will create enabling environment for businesses to thrive, but it was important for stakeholders to work together.

"A municipality is an instrument to change the lives of our people. It's important for us jointly to work with the royal leaders to ensure that there is proper planning in the allocation of land."

The Executive Mayor was joined by the MMC for Local Economic Development Cllr Christinah Mohale. Also in attendance was Kgosi Malesela Dikgale, the chairperson of Limpopo House of Traditional Leaders.

### Newly-appointed chairperson of LNW Board visits the Giyani Regional Bulk Water Project



The newly-appointed chairperson of Lepelle Northern Water Board, Joe Mathebula says that all stakeholders need to work together for a successful completion of the Giyani Regional Bulk Water project. He said this during his visit to the project in July.

Mathebula visited Nandoni Water Treatment Works and several villages where the project is implemented. He was joined by MMC for infrastructure Cllr Given Malatji and MMC for Water and Sanitation Cllr Maditshego Sefufi.

"There is still a lot of work to be done, but what is important is for the stakeholders to work together. The role of traditional leaders and communities is very important in ensuring that the project is completed to address their needs.

"But communities also have a bigger role to play in protecting the infrastructure against theft and vandalism," he said.





Executive Mayor welcomes screening and testing unit from DBSA



The Executive Mayor of Mopani District Municipality Councillor Pule Shayi has welcomed a donation of a portable screening and testing unit as well as personal protective equipment from the Development Bank of Southern Africa (DBSA).

The unit is a two roomed unit fully equipped with water, chairs, medical storage cupboard and disability friendly. It has They are flexible and can be used beyond Covid19 crisis. The facility will be operated by officials from the Department of Health and will service all officials and members of the public visiting the government complex in Giyani.

The Executive Mayor said the District Command Council on covid-19 was observing a slight decline in the number covid-19 daily of infections in the district, but should also be preparing for the new wave. Shayi said the donation from DBSA "comes at a right moment so that we are able to confront the new wave if we are to be confronted by some serious increases. Our response rate will become more practical."

The DBSA has recently started work in the Greater Letaba Municipality and Greater Giyani Municipality where they are refurbishing water infrastructure, and will also be purchasing three water tankers for the district. Shavi said

"To us this is significant in that we are beginning to see first-hand the impact of the work done by DBSA in advancing the developmental agenda in the region".

Also speaking during the handover, the Group Executive for DBSA Chuene Ramphele said "we recognize the impact of covid-19 at local government level. We recognize the tireless efforts by your district command centre in tackling this invisible enemy to the lives of our people.

"The district is mandated to promote sustainable provision and delivery of basic services. All these mandates will not be realized if we don't join forces to fight the covid-19 pandemic and its disruption. We hope this unit will be used in partnership with the department of health and maintained properly for the purpose of fighting the coronavirus."



He said that Mopani was the second District Municipality in the country to receive the unit. "The DBSA recognizes the moral reason to stand solidarity to the South African Government and those governments of SADC in fighting the pandemic and allocated, despite constrained financial resources, an amount of R150m. This we directed to address the health diagnostics, testing, isolation, protective equipment, health facilities and water provision.

"We have identified25 districts in the country to provide screening unit and associated PPE. We are handing over this immaculate unit and associated PPE to the District today with the conviction of strengthening the District Command Centre efforts to fight the pandemic and protect the lives of the communities within the jurisdiction of Mopani District. This is our gesture to assure that DBSA is behind your District strategy to safeguard the heath of its people."



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### DD Shitlhangu pays glowing tribute to his secretary as colleagues bid farewell to him

he former senior manager for community services Dumisani "DD" Shitlhangu has paid a glowing tribute to his secretary Matimba Mabunda whom he described as a "co-manager."

The Municipal Manager Quiet Kgatla wished Shitlhangu well on his future endeavours. "We are happy to have worked with you at senior management level. You have made your contribution to this institution. We do send our best wishes for the future. We have made so many wonderful memories together."







# Executive Mayor says MPAC is key in strengthening good governance and accountability.





The Executive Mayor of Mopani District Municipality Cllr Pule Shayi has told the MPAC public hearing that the municipality will always embrace the work of the Municipal Public Accounts Committee in order to improve on good governance and accountability.

He was delivering the closing remarks to the public hearing held in July. The Executive Mayor said "we have reaffirmed our utmost respect for the work of MPAC, but also declared our commitment not to undermine the recommendations of all other oversight committees of council.

"We wish to once again recommit to work with these committees, which in the main seek to assist our work as we strive to effectively and efficiently utilize the resources allocated to us on behalf of the people of this district."

The Executive Mayor said the work of MPAC is very key in support of efforts to build a strong, accountable, transparent and resilient system of local government. He said that implementing recommendations of MPAC will assist the municipality to move from negative audit findings.

"We continue to strive towards attainment of a clean audit, and through the work of MPAC and other committees of council, we are able to build from the progress we have made in moving from an adverse finding to a qualified finding. Because until such time we achieve a clean audit, our work of changing the lives of the people of this district will also be undermined."

He further said that there must be speedy resolution to cases of misconduct, saying "At the level of council, we have adopted a consequence management policy which should be implemented without fear or favour, but equally we have a responsibility that cases of misconduct are prolonged without cause.

"It will not be this administration that turns a blind eye when officials are found to negligent in the spending of public funds, and we are empowered by section 176 (2) of the Municipal Finance Management Act. We have made this commitment to our people when we entered into the social contract in 2016. We also need to monitor the functionality of the Anti-corruption forum," said the Executive Mayor.

## Council adopts a R1,8 billion budget for Special Virtual Sitting of Council held on unday, 28 June has adopted a R1,8 billion financial year. In his

A Special Virtual Sitting of Council held on Sunday, 28 June has adopted a R1,8 billion budget for the 2020/21 financial year. In his budget speech, the Executive Mayor Cllr Pule Shayi said that "while we continue to work towards the achievement of the targets clearly set out in the social contract as entered into with our people in 2016, the programme of action adopted in Kliptown in 1955 remains the ultimate yardstick for this government. We work towards the full realization of the Freedom Charter goals."

The Executive Mayor has once again called on councillors and officials to service their water services accounts with their local municipalities, and also said "we need to honour our repayments commitment on our debts with both Lepelle Northern Water and DWS."

The municipality has signed a repayment agreement with Lepelle Northern water in which it pays **R180 million** per annum towards the historic debt.

In the 2020/21 financial year, the municipality has budgeted an amount of **R50 million** in which it will repay the historic debt owed to Local Municipalities on losses incurred in the running of water and sanitation function. Furthermore, the municipality has put aside **R53 million** for repayment of Department of Water and Sanitation for the raw bulk water extraction.

An amount of **R500 thousands** has been set aside to assist in preparing for the launch of the district development model later this year. Shayi said "through this model, development will be pursued through a single and integrated plans per district, it means that work must begin now for us to synchronise the work of all these departments with our Integrated Development Plan.

"The model emphasises closer support to Local Government by both National and Provincial spheres, where district municipalities will be properly supported and adequately resourced to speed up service delivery."
