The second award is for being usage of Social Media Platforms, which we must also give credit to all the people in the district who are following our social media platforms. We wouldn't have received this recognition without your support.



Executive Mayor's desk

We have come to the end of third quarter in the 2024/26 financial year. We conclude the quarter having recently adopted at the level of Council, the draft reviewed draft reviewed Integrated Development Plan 2025/26 together with the draft Budget . This integrated development plan is grounded on the social compact made with our people around the programme of building better communities together.

Our work at this level of our democratic government is done within the framework of the district development model which is about improved, well-coordinated, accelerated service delivery in the district space. Through this model, various stakeholders including the other spheres of our democratic

government, the business community and civil society actively participated in shaping the programmes as detailed in this reviewed integrated development plan.

We take this opportunity to implore members of the public and all stakeholders to participate consultative meetings which are set to start in the coming weeks. It is through those consultative meetings that we were able to receive inputs on the most immediate needs and aspirations of our people across the district.

We have committed to expand the provision of basic services to address the backlog, particularly the water provision to our communities in the district. We have to ensure that more and more of our people in the district have access to piped water in their homes. We will be prioritizing the electrification of boreholes while also ensuring that we protect and secure our water resources.

We end the quarter with the celebration of Human Rights Month which is always an opportunity to remember and honour those who made it possible for us to achieve freedom and democracy. The many people who paid the ultimate price for us to enjoy this freedom. During this month, we honour in particular the 69 heroes and heroines who were shot and killed by the evil apartheid regime on March, 21 of 1960.

The commemoration of the Sharpeville massacre will remain a reminder of the journey we have travelled as a country. Through the selfless sacrifices of our lorebears, we are today, all guaranteed of human rights, including the right to life, equality and human dignity.

Well of course, the commemoration of this year's human rights also coincides with the 70th anniversary of the adoption of the Freedom Charter, which proclaims that "South Africa belongs to all who live in it" and that "all shall be equal before the law."

The best ways to honour the sacrifices made by our forebears in our struggle for liberation, and also to strengthen and defend the legitimacy of our hard-fought democracy is to deliver quality sustainable services to our people. Executive Mayor Cllr. Pule Shayi handed over vehicles to artisans who are working within the Water Services Directorate, saying this will help the team to respond faster to issues of water provision in the district.

Speaking during the handover ceremony which was held on Tuesday, 25 February at the Disaster Manager Centre, the Executive Mayor said he was aware that the vehicles were still not enough, but the current batch will go a long in improving service delivery.

"We are handing over 15 bakkies in the context of operations and maintenance. Our people need sustainable water provision on continuous basis. They frown at uninspiring service delivery. These vehicles will go a long way in helping us to deal with operations and maintenance, water leaks and repairs so that our response time is even faster," he said.























"LOT OF WORK AHEAD, BUT WE ARE NOT WEARY"- EXECUTIVE MAYOR TELLS MPAC









Mopani District Municipality's Executive Mayor Cllr. Pule Shayi has conceded that there is lot of work to done to change the municipal audit outcome, but says the Municipality is upbeat about the future.

Delivering the closing address to the MPAC public hearing held at Metz village in Maruleng Municipality, the Executive Mayor said "Mopani District Municipality is on a qualified audit opinion for a second consecutive year, which is not consistent with our target as the fifth council.

"But we should as well indicate that it represents progress from where we were when we started as the fifth council. We still have a huge volume of work ahead of us, but we are not weary. We remain determined to run the course, and finish strongly. It is our shared determination, working with the people of Mopani that will see us through."

He took the opportunity to thank MPAC for work done in investigating unauthorized, irregular, fruitless, and wasteful expenditures dating back from the 2010/11 financial year. He said that Council knows where the bulk of the challenges are.

"There is general consensus that improvement in the audit opinion is intimately tied to the work of MPAC. Therefore, it is important that we pay maximum attention on the areas raised by the AGSA, but also how we proceed in implementing the recommendations arising from the work of MPAC.

"In the past the AGSA had raised, consistently the key risk areas, which of course we have been trying to attend to and this include, the quality of financial statements, quality of submitted performance information, improving on supply chain management, and our financial health," he said.

He said that the Municipality has already established a Unit that is responsible for financial reporting. "As we speak today, we have appointed Deputy Manager responsible for reporting together with accountants whose work would solely be on reporting and ensuring that we compile annual financial statements inhouse.

"And this of course means that the practice of consistent monthly reconciliations becomes embedded to our work. We have to perform on a monthly, the reconciliation on the water sales transactions with the local Municipalities," the Executive Mayor said.



MDM REAFFIRMS ITS STRATEGIC GOAL AS IT SETS OUR PLANS FOR 2025/26 FINANCIAL YEAR

The Mopani District Municipality has reaffirmed is strategic goal "to be the food basket of Southern Africa and the tourism destination of choice." This was confirmed by delegates the three-day strategic planning session held at Bela-Bela from 19 - 21 February 2025.

Addressing delegates at the start of the session, Executive Mayor Cllr. Pule Shayi said plans at the district must be aligned to the three priorities for the 7th Administration around inclusive growth and job creation, reducing poverty and tackling the high cost of living, and building a capable, ethical and developmental state.

He said that major breakthroughs were recorded by the Fifth Council. "The journey of this fifth council has not been an easy one, but through our collective efforts and shared determination, profound progress has indeed been made. We have covered so much ground in the past three years, and to that extent we should be able to reflect on that journey, the footprint left behind, but most importantly we should use this session to look to the future."



















The Executive Mayor used his opening address to implore delegates to help explore ways to grown the district's economy, saying "as we converge at this level, we have to plan for the more than 1,3 million people in the district. As we converge ourselves here, unemployment rate is at over 35% in the district. We wish to lionize the private sector's contributions that enhances the economic prospects of this district, but also impacting in more ways than one the lives of our people."

He said that efforts to deliver sustainable water to the people is compromised by the ageing infrastructure. "The issue of ageing water infrastructure is a big challenge. We therefore should be debating plans to expand the infrastructure, but as well discuss what funding model would be quicker for us to meet the growing demand."

The strategic planning session also received presentations from Limpopo Connexion on the broadband infrastructure rollout, LIEDA on their investment catalogue, Letaba TVET College on the Water Adaptation Strategy through LED. The Malte Pluvian Holdings & the University of Limpopo Digital Hub made a presentation on the Mopani Agriculture Research Laboratory.

In his closing remarks, the Executive Mayor reaffirmed the priorities that include resource mobilization for water infrastructure provision, improving on project management, improving the audit opinion, cultivating a strong professional working culture, and enhancing the skills capacity of the workforce.

WORLD WETLANDS DAY COMMEMORATION COMPETITION WORKSHOP





Back 2 School






