

OPERATION FIX ALL

in full swing across the district



The aggressive program to fix boreholes as part of OperationFixAll Campaign has reignited hope in communities across the district with people receiving water supply after many months of struggle.

Since the start of the campaign two weeks ago, the Executive Mayor and members of his mayoral committee have been out in communities to monitor the work as carried out by the Water Services' maintenance team to fix the dysfunctional boreholes. Through this campaign, the Municipality aims to fix boreholes in villages across the district.



The Executive Mayor led a team that visited Makhwibidung and Khujwana in the first week of the campaign in early August where boreholes have been refurbished. MMC Lucky Mohlala led a team that visited Kampersrus in Maruleng where a borehole and a package plant have been refurbished to service that community.

Another team led by MMC Basani Shibambu and MMC Nomsa Khandlela visited Xikukwane in the Greater Tzaneen Municipality where four of the five boreholes have been fixed to help augment water supplied from the Giyani Water Works. The team also visited Mayephu where three boreholes have been fixed.

On Thursday, 07 August, the Executive Mayor led a team on a visit to Benfarm village and Matiko-Xikaya in the Ba-Phalaborwa where boreholes have also been fixed. The team led by MMC Maditshego Sefufi, MMC Lucky Mohlala and MMC Nyiko Baloyi visited Noblehoek in Ward 01 of the Greater Giyani Municipality where three of the four boreholes have been fixed.

“We are on the streets with our people every week dealing with issues of water in the context of Operation Fix All – Hi Nwa Mati. Getting water is preceded by fixing the infrastructure that is in a state of disrepair. We have an obligation to fix all the boreholes in the entire district,” the Executive Mayor said.

General Manyike, a member of the water committee in Noblehoek said the community was relieved now that water was flowing in their taps. Three of the four boreholes in the villages have been fixed and providing water to the community, but there is also scheduled supply from Middle-Letaba Dam. “We are excited to have water, especially from Middle-Letaba which we have not had for 10 years. Just glad that we now have water right here in our homes,” he said.
